 Planning is adapted according to the interests of the individuals Social learning theories are important Observation of participants is important The Forest School leader is seen as a facilitator rather than 'expert' Forest School leader must hold the Level 3 qualification Level 3 qualification has outdoor 2 day first aid qualification Use of woodland tools Use of fire Takes place in a woodland setting or an environment that is 'wild enough' High adult pupil ratios (1:8 or less) Suitable for a wide range of needs 	 Balanced approach between child-initiated and teacher led activities Learning linked to the curriculum and more in line with classroom based learning Typical links with science, geography and art education Aims to support indoor learning on a wider scale Play is not an important part of the experience. Based on traditional theories of learning with the leader seen as expert Can be delivered by all educators – teachers and support staff No formal qualification No requirement for first aid No tools No fire Can happen in any outdoor setting Usually takes place with whole class and adult: pupil ratios more like 1:15 Session length will vary Aims to get children to engage with nature and the natural environment. 	 Usually led by an adult with specific skill sets and knowledge Aims to get children to have a better understanding of environmental issues, extending to a global scale Helps participants to develop an appreciation of nature and how to live more sustainably Includes links to the curriculum (water, plants and soils, geology, climate, waste and recycling, politics etc) May include field study education, gardening projects, earth education and city farms Close links with outdoor learning Usually led by people with specialist knowledge such as rangers, education officers within specific settings Usually delivered in an outdoor environment but some aspects delivered indoors Typically delivered with whole classes and larger groups.

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
